What the Civil Service Exam Is

Before studying any subject, it helps to understand clearly what the Civil Service Exam is, why it exists, and what passing it does for you. A reviewer who understands the exam as a whole studies with purpose; one who does not is working in the dark.

This chapter explains the exam's purpose, its two levels, and the eligibility that passing it grants. It is the orientation that frames everything else in this guide and in the subject study guides that accompany it.

Lesson

The purpose of the exam

The Civil Service Examination is administered by the Civil Service Commission, the central personnel agency of the Philippine government. Its purpose is to identify people who have the basic competencies needed for government work, so that appointment to public positions is based on merit and fitness rather than on connections or favor. The exam is, in short, the merit gate to a career in public service.

Passing the exam grants what is called civil service eligibility — a formal qualification that makes you eligible for appointment to government positions that require it. Eligibility is a lasting credential; it does not expire, though the specific position you may hold depends on the level of eligibility you earn and the requirements of each job.

The two levels of the exam

The Civil Service Exam is offered at two levels, and choosing the right one is the first decision a reviewer makes.

Level	Eligibility it grants	Generally suited to
Professional	Second-level eligibility	Positions involving professional, technical, or scientific work, and supervisory roles
Sub-Professional	First-level eligibility	Clerical, trades, crafts, and custodial positions

The Professional level qualifies a person for a broader range of government positions, including those that require a bachelor's degree. The Sub-Professional level qualifies a person for first-level positions such as clerical work. Many reviewers aim for the Professional level because of the wider range of positions it opens, but the right choice depends on your goals and the positions you intend to apply for.



What the exam covers

Both levels test general aptitude rather than specialized knowledge of any single field. The Professional level covers verbal ability, numerical ability, analytical ability, and general information. The Sub-Professional level covers verbal ability, numerical ability, and clerical ability. The subject study guides in this series — one volume per subtest — cover this material in full.

ELIGIBILITY IS EARNED BY MERIT

The entire point of the Civil Service Exam is merit: it ensures that the people appointed to government positions have demonstrated the basic competencies the work requires. Passing it is not a formality — it is a genuine qualification that you carry for the rest of your career.

Strategy & Common Traps

Choosing your level

Decide early which level you are preparing for, because it determines which subtests you must study. Consider the positions you want to apply for and their eligibility requirements.

- If you intend to apply for professional, technical, or supervisory positions — including those requiring a degree — prepare for the Professional level.
- If you intend to apply for clerical or first-level positions, the Sub-Professional level may be the right fit.
- When in doubt, the Professional eligibility opens the wider range of positions, but it also covers an additional subtest (analytical ability and general information) to study.

MATCH YOUR PREPARATION TO YOUR LEVEL

There is no benefit in studying subtests your chosen level does not include. Confirm your target level first, then study exactly the subtests it covers — for Professional, all four; for Sub-Professional, verbal, numerical, and clerical.
